**Violinist, Singer-Songwriter and Broadway Composer**

Gaelynn Lea got her big break when she won NPR Music's Tiny Desk Contest in 2016. Since then, she has been captivating audiences around the world with her haunting original songs and traditional fiddle tunes, and has collaborated with Michael Stipe, The Decemberists, and even Pigface. In 2022, Gaelynn Lea composed and recorded the original score for *Macbeth* on Broadway, starring Daniel Craig and Ruth Negga. Thanks to a Whippoorwill Arts Fellowship, her theatrically-inspired soundtrack came out in May 2025. She followed this up with a 10-city UK album release tour. - **How to Engage Effectively With Legislators:** Learn practical tips and effective ways to connect with and Legislators. Speaker: Speaker, Tami Reuter, MRCI
- **Reimagining the Internship: A Partnership-Driven Model with Businesses:** This session introduces an innovative internship model built on deep, intentional collaboration with businesses that redefines how providers support competitive employment for people with disabilities. Unlike traditional internships, this approach begins with intensive employer engagement before placements occur. While businesses are not required to hire, many choose to do so after seeing individuals succeed on the job. The presenters will share how this model works, why the business partnership strategy is central to its success, and how these principles, not just the structure, can inform replication efforts that lead to meaningful, competitive employment outcomes. - **Principles of Therapeutic Intervention (Part 1 of 2):** Therapeutic interventions are purposeful, planned actions designed to promote positive, lasting change, modify destructive behaviors, and support personal growth. - **Continuous Improvement In Action:** In this session, participants will hear about the five core disciplines that define a learning organization. As a socially assistive humanoid robot, Nao is being designed to work *with* and *for* each person, adapting to their unique needs through individualized, person-centered programming. **Assistive Technology Demo Room – Open All Day!**

Explore a hands-on showcase of assistive technology tools designed to support diverse learners and enhance accessibility in your program. - **Hippotherapy, How Horses Can Add Value To People's Lives:** In this one hour session, attendees will learn how horses are used in this therapy by physical, occupational, and speech therapists to treat individuals with neurological, physical, or sensory impairments, such as autism, cerebral palsy, stroke, and multiple sclerosis using the rhythmic, three-dimensional movement of a horse to improve balance, coordination, strength, posture, and speech. - **Advancing Employment First: Addressing Benefits Concerns at All Levels:** Through the DHS Lead Agency Employment First Capacity Building Grant, six counties are strengthening their focus on employment. As case managers and assessors initiate more conversations about work, individuals are asking more questions about how employment impacts their benefits — a top concern in some counties. - **Setting People Up for Success: Supporting Individuals with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD):** This session will provide the audience with a basic understanding of fetal alcohol spectrum disorders and a variety of tips and strategies to support and help individuals succeed in at work and in the community. - **Your Roadmap to the Pathway to Employment:** This one-hour training provides attendees with a practical overview of the pathway to competitive, integrated employment for people with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD). Participants will explore key stages of employment and the roles of service providers in supporting successful outcomes to employment. The session introduces tools and resources and explains how to use them effectively. - **Employment Strategies for Individuals with Higher Support Needs—Lessons Learned:** Supporting individuals with higher support needs to achieve competitive, integrated employment requires equal parts creativity, persistence, and partnership. In this panel discussion, MTI facilitators and provider leaders share practical strategies and "lessons learned" from the field to help you navigate the unknown, design individualized supports, and build the staff capacity necessary for meaningful outcomes. Central to this discussion are the insights gained from a recent pilot program specifically designed to challenge the status quo. By focusing on individuals who have historically been overlooked for competitive employment, this pilot integrated Community Life Engagement (CLE) to ensure that vocational goals were paired with a holistic, person-centered "good life." Attendees will explore how this approach led to significant life outcomes for all six participants, leaving with actionable ideas and renewed confidence in what is truly possible for every individual.
